Our Secretary reports a slow decline in our membership numbers to where we are not just above 500 - same as 1968. This is a good time to get your faithful crew aboard.


Your Long Range Race Planning Committee is anxious to hear from you. This is a fairly new group, and they would welcome your thoughts and ideas on how to improve our races.
